Under their Economic Development program, the Foundation has two areas of focus that could be relevant to you: Community Services (Support is given to social services organizations that benefit the health, education, quality of life or provide essential services for low-and moderate-income individuals and families.); Revitalization & Stabilization of Low-and Moderate-Income Areas (The PNC Foundation supports nonprofit organizations that serve low-and moderate-income neighborhoods by improving living and working conditions. Support is given to organizations that help stabilize communities, eliminate blight and attract and retain businesses and residents to the community.)

2) Scaife Family Foundation (Substance Abuse and Addiction Focus):

Since its inception in 1985, the Foundation has provided more than \$150 million in donations for non-profit programs and general operating support. Their primary objective is to match the Foundation with non-profit organizations having similar interest areas and goals. They have a specific addiction program, and support programs and organizations that eliminate these obstacles and provide addiction prevention, intervention, treatment and recovery. This includes both residential and outpatient facilities that provide additional services like job placement and career counseling. They also partner with nonprofits who are advancing the field of addiction through research, education and training to help counselors respond more effectively to substance use and related issues. The Foundation's service area is not limited to any particular geographical area within the United States but they will historically consider South Florida and Western Pennsylvania first.

3) Elevance Health Foundation (Substance Use Disorder Focus):

Over the next three years, the Elevance Health Foundation will invest up to \$90 million in partnerships and programs that address health inequities by demonstrating measurable and positive change in four key areas: Maternal and Child Health, Food as Medicine, Substance Use Disorder, Disaster Relief. The Foundation is emphasizing programs that promote equity in mental health, particularly for people with substance use disorders. They are focusing on programs that include prevention, crisis response, and harm-reduction strategies and reduce barriers to trauma-informed approaches. National programs promoting scalable and sustainable systemic change as well as local programs in California, Georgia, Indiana, New York, Ohio, and Virginia that support socially vulnerable populations with relevant interventions are eligible.

4) Cigna Foundation (Mental and Behavioral Health-Focus):

For more than 50 years, the Cigna Foundation has been delivering on Cigna's mission, alongside its nonprofit partners, to improve the health, well-being, and peace of mind of people around the world. Their charitable giving philosophy focuses on socioeconomic status, education, neighborhood and physical environment, employment, and social support networks, as well as access to health care – otherwise known as Social Determinants of Health (SDOH). They have a Health and Well-Being program that could be relevant for you. This program addresses several critical areas of health, including health navigation to improve overall access to care, treatment, and prescriptions; prevention, treatment, and research of chronic diseases; wellness programs promoting exercise, fitness, and healthy lifestyle choices; programs addressing mental and/or behavioral health conditions; dental programs; and maternal, prenatal, and newborn health.

Funding Range: Requests between \$50,000 and \$100,000 per year.

5) The Max and Victoria Dreyfus Foundation:

The Max and Victoria Dreyfus Foundation will consider grants for IRS-qualified non-profit organizations located within the United States. The Foundation aims to support organizations and programs for which a relatively small amount of funding might make a large difference. The Foundation will consider requests to support museums, cultural and performing arts programs; schools and hospitals; educational, skills-training and other programs for youth, seniors, and persons with disabilities; environmental and wildlife protection activities; and other community-based organizations and programs.

Funding Range: Awards typically range from \$1,000 to \$20,000.

6) The Lawrence Foundation:

The Foundation makes grants to US based qualified charitable organizations in the following areas of interest: Environment, Human Services, Disaster relief, Other. Nonprofit organizations that qualify for public charity status under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code or public schools and libraries are eligible for contributions or grants. There are no geographical restrictions and a portion of any grant that they award can be used for reasonable indirect costs.

Funding Range: Grants typically range between \$5,000 - \$10,000. In some limited cases they may make larger grants, but that is typically after they have gotten to know your organization over a period of time. They also generally don't make multi-year grants.

Submission Deadline: The foundation has two grant deadlines: April 30 or October 31.

Application Materials: Submit a grant application by using the Common Grant Application website, which includes some contact information, a brief description of your organization and funding needs, confirmation of your tax-exempt status and the amount of money you are requesting.

The DanPaul Foundation provides grants to 501(c)3 tax-exempt non-profit organizations as defined by the IRS. The Foundation actively supports programs that meet the needs of economically disadvantaged populations. Proposals that incorporate partnerships with community groups and local organizations are encouraged. CICF makes grants to organizations that are located or operate in U.S. communities where the cruise industry maintains vessel operations, employs significant numbers of individuals, or purchases products and services from strategic business partners; and that carry out programs and activities that confer significant local community benefits. Thus, CICF considers grants from organizations that operate in communities where the cruise industry does business whether in port or non-port states.

A central element of Centene's business strategy involves their focus on holistic wellness. That principle has shaped their approach to community investments, paving the way for Centene to continue its support of long-term and far-reaching initiatives focused on healthcare access, education, and social services. Contributions are made only to qualified, federal tax-exempt 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations, as defined by the Internal Revenue Service Code, through The Centene Charitable Foundation. Contributions are restricted to nonprofit organizations serving local residents in areas in which Centene has a presence (Florida is included). Consideration will be given to organizations that fall within one or more of the following areas of focus: Healthcare Access (Including Social Determinants of Health); Education; Social Services.

14) Osceola County - Community Service Agency Grant Program (Osceola-County Focus):

The CSA program is intended to provide funding to organizations providing services that improve the quality of life for residents of Osceola County in at least one of the following ways: Providing a unique service that enhances the mental and physical health of residents; Providing a unique service that builds an educated and sustainable community; Providing a unique service that demonstrates the ability to assist a segment of population experiencing unemployment, homelessness, and other issues in order to develop skills that will support sustainability. In addition to the stated purpose of the funds, the non-profit or civic organizations that apply for funding must provide: A completed application for funding; Evidence that the State of Florida recognizes the organization as a nonprofit charitable or civic organization; Letter from the Internal Revenue Service recognizing the organization as holding tax exempt status: 501(C)3, 501(C)4 or 501(C)6; A copy of the most recent organizational financial audit; Evidence that the organization has been in operations for at least two years; and Evidence that shows that the organization provides a service that fulfills one or more element of the BOCC's strategic plan.

This may not be an appropriate grant for you at this point because they want to fund organizations that have been in operation for at least two years but you can try in the future. I'm including this here for your reference.

15) Walmart.org Local Community Grants (Health and Human Service-Focus):

The local community grants are awarded through an open application process and provide funding directly from Walmart and Sam's Club facilities to local organizations in the U.S.

Eligible nonprofit organizations must operate on the local level (or be an affiliate/chapter of a larger organization that operates locally) and directly benefit the service area of the facility from which they are requesting funding. There are eight (8) areas of funding for which an organization can apply. The relevant one for your non-profit is:

- **Health and Human Service:** Providing medical screening, treatment, social services, or shelters for low-income individuals and families in the local service area

Funding Range: Local Community grants range from a minimum of \$250 to a maximum of \$5,000.

There are no program limitations; however, the foundation has a practice of primarily supporting capital projects. The Foundation does not typically provide grants for operating expenses. There are no geographic limitations; however, the foundation has a practice of primarily supporting organizations located in Alabama, Florida, Michigan and South Carolina.

20) Edyth Bush Charitable Foundation (Osceola County and Healthcare-Focus):

The Foundation welcomes grant requests from otherwise eligible tax-exempt organizations under Internal Revenue Code Sections 501(c)(3) and Section 509(a) headquartered within the Orlando MSA of Orange, Seminole, Osceola, and Lake Counties, Florida. The Foundation is operated exclusively for charitable, religious, literary, and other exempt purposes. Special consideration will be given to distributions and grants to charitable, religious and educational organizations which are organized and operated to help underprivileged or needy people to improve themselves, or to relieve human suffering. The Foundation has broad interests in human service, education, health care and a limited interest in the arts.

Funding Range: Grants range from \$5,000 to \$50,000

21) Alvah H. and Wylene P. Chapman Foundation (Substance Abuse Prevention-Focus):

The Foundation supports spiritual, scientific, historical, environmental, literary and educational charitable endeavors & community initiatives. Main areas of interest for Foundation support are:

children & families, education, substance abuse prevention, multicultural understanding, natural and historical conservation and programs serving the homeless. The Foundation makes grants for operating support, specific projects and endowments. Grants are awarded in communities where the family and directors reside or have been involved (Florida included). All grant requests must have a Director or member of the Foundation sponsor or endorse the submission. If you do not have an endorsement, please first submit a Letter of Inquiry. Successful applicants will be invited by a Director to submit a grant application. The foundation prefers not to make multi-year commitments.

Funding Range: Up to \$15,000

Regional Focus: Florida

Submission Deadline: Grants are considered twice a year in December and June. Deadline for submission for the December meeting is October 15. Deadline for the June meeting is May 15.

22) Dr. Phillips Charities (Osceola County-Focus):

Dr. Phillips Charities comprised of Dr. Phillips, Inc. and The Dr. P. Phillips Foundation, honors the legacy of the Phillips family and supports organizations that live up to the motto "helping others help themselves." As stewards of the Phillips family legacy, it ensures that charitable contributions honor and contribute to the Phillips family vision. Dr. Phillips Charities considers grants that have a significant and lasting impact on Central Florida, including capital projects and innovative programs that address critical community needs and demonstrate potential for ongoing community support. Dr. Phillips Charities primarily supports not-for-profit organizations that serve Orange and Osceola Counties in Florida, and that have completed five full years of operation after the date of receipt of its tax exempt determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service. Grants are made only to organizations exempt from federal taxation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended. Primary areas of support include: 1) Education, 2) Children & Youth, 3) Arts & Culture, 4) Health, 5) Social Services (includes food banks and organizations working with the homeless). **You would not be eligible for this now because your non-profit organization is brand new but this would be a good donor for you to pursue over the next few years.**

Funding Range: Dr. Phillips Charities awards grants ranging from a few thousand dollars to more than \$1 million dollars. The size of the grant depends upon the purpose of the request, the scope and significance of the project, the overall budget of the organization, and the diversity of the organization's funding sources.

are not intended to limit the interest of the Foundation from considering other worthwhile projects. In general, the Foundation guidelines are broad to give them flexibility in providing grants. The majority of their grants are made in the U.S.

Funding Range: On average, their grants range from \$5,000 to \$25,000.

Hi,

Here is the list of available grants. You will have noticed that I listed more than 10. That's because I want to make sure to give you many options that you can pick from. Also, some grants have application deadlines that have passed. It's helpful for you to have the information for these grants so you can apply for them later this year. There are also some grants that may not be appropriate for you right this second (as the donors would like to fund non-profit organizations that have a longer track record) but you should keep these donors in mind and try to apply for their grants in the future; that is why I have included them on the list.

You will also see that there are quite a few Foundation grants that specifically focus on supporting non-profits in Florida and some that have giving areas in substance abuse/mental health programs. I think it would be a great opportunity to apply to some of these more regional/local and theme-specific grants because you will have less competition. The grants that are open to non-profit organizations from around the country are receiving thousands of applications, so it is harder to stand out when applying to those.

I would personally recommend focusing on the following applications: #1, #2, #12, #13, #16, #18, #19, #20, #21, #24. I would also make sure to consider #3, #4, and #8 when the applications open later this year.
