To compete for City contracts and receive funding to provide health and human services, organizations must register for NYC.ID, obtain a PASSPort Account, complete the PASSPort HHS Prequalification Application, and propose to a Request for Proposal. For more information, visit nyc.gov/passport. Nonprofit organizations that wish to receive discretionary funding must submit a City Council Discretionary Funding Application. The Application is generally available in January for six weeks only. [City Council's website provides](#) information on the application and submission schedule. There is also the Mayor's Fund to Advance New York City which frequently seeks the expertise of nonprofit organizations to provide a variety of services to fulfill ongoing initiatives with New York City agencies - mainly focused on supporting public programs in areas including mental health, youth workforce development, immigration and citizenship, domestic violence, financial empowerment and support for young men and women of color. 2) Brooklyn Community Foundation:

The Foundation's [Grantmaking Programs](#) and [Special Initiatives](#) are operated in alignment with a racial justice lens. Funding priorities include: Organizations that have a deep commitment to the people of Brooklyn; Organizations led by members of the communities they serve; Multi-year general operating support wherever possible.

New York Foundation Core Grants are \$47,500 per year, up to 3 years for established groups and 5 years for emerging groups. In order to be eligible for funding from the New York Foundation, your organization must: 1) Be based in NYC, 2) Be a 501c3 non-profit organization, 3) Use community organizing & grassroots advocacy as primary strategies to address the root causes of oppression.

Funding Range: They have small grants of \$10,000 and regular grants up to \$47,500.

4) The John A. Reisenbach Foundation:

This Foundation offers grants and The Amplify Your Impact Prize for eligible non-profit organizations in New York City. Their grants support the following programs: 1) Youth and Education Grants, 2) Housing and Community Grants, 3) Justice and Safety Grants, 4) Pandemic Relief Grants. The Amplify Your Impact Prize is an initiative of the John A. Reisenbach Foundation that provides high-potential new programs in New York City with:

- A one-year package of media consultations, workshops, and connections
- A one-time cash award to be used for general operating activities during the prize year

This is a unique opportunity for exceptional new programs to accelerate their growth by connecting with a wide range of partners, funders, beneficiaries, and supporters. All organizations applying to this accelerator program are required to be 501c3 nonprofits. Eligible programs must be in their first several years of operation. The nonprofit must have a CEO, Executive Director or committed staffer that can attend all workshops. Nonprofits applying must serve beneficiaries in the greater New York City area and mission must fit into one of the three John A. Reisenbach Foundation pillars: Youth & Education, Housing & Community, Justice & Safety.

5) Robin Hood:

Robin Hood partners with over 300 nonprofits to support food, housing, education, legal services, workforce development, and more to New Yorkers living in poverty across all five boroughs. Robin Hood is a strategic grantmaker. They initiate and develop long-term projects and partnerships that provide the best opportunity to deliver maximum impact. As a result, they typically source funding opportunities in collaboration with organizations in the field, rather than via unsolicited proposals. However, they recently activated a simple open application form to allow any and all prospective grantees to reach out with interest. The eligibility criteria includes: Robin Hood will only fund 501(c)(3) organizations providing services in New York City; Robin

Hood only funds projects that elevate New Yorkers out of poverty so the project needs to serve low-income New Yorkers.

6) Citizens Committee for New York City:

CitizensNYC is making \$1 million in direct cash grants to New Yorkers to improve the quality of life in their neighborhoods. Community Leaders Grants support community-led projects with grants of up to \$3,000. Each grantee partner awarded has access to resources and their network of like-minded community leaders. CitizensNYC makes direct cash grants for neighborhood-led projects, and neighborhood businesses that improve the quality of life in New York City.

Tiger Foundation's funding is primarily focused on proven, high-impact, direct human services. Applicants must be exempt from income taxes under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Requests for support are not considered for individuals, annual or capital campaigns, endowments, benefits, public policy or lobbying efforts, legal assistance, existing obligations, or debt liability.

Funding Range: Tiger Foundation provides one-year grants typically ranging in size from \$50,000 to \$300,000, with an average grant size around \$200,000.

The Foundation's framework is rooted in gender, racial, and economic justice, based on trust, and guided by community. Their values include the following:

- Effective and sustainable solutions come from within communities.

9) Association for A Better New York:

The 2023 Priority Areas of Giving in the theme of New York City's Inclusive Economic Recovery, Revitalization, and Growth are:

- Arts, Culture & Entertainment: Programs that promote cultural experiences throughout New York City's business districts affected negatively by the economic downturn created by the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Public Realm Revitalization & Improved Livability: Projects and efforts that reimagine neighborhood and economic revitalization through public space and streetscape improvements in commercial districts.
- Public Safety: Programs that safeguard the public from crimes, disasters, and other potential dangers and threats.
- Small Business Support: Services to support new and existing small business operations and resources to help them open, re-open, operate, sustain, and grow.

Each year, they fund over 600 nonprofit organizations working to foster strength, sustainability, and inclusivity in their service territory. They provide financial support to tax-exempt nonprofit organizations as defined under Section 501 (c)(3) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code. They do not award grants to public schools, private foundations, individuals, labor groups, organizations or programs operating principally outside their service area, or media or literacy projects not connected with an organization.

11) Robert Sterling Clark Foundation:

The Foundation is dedicated to helping create and sustain a vibrant and equitable New York City. They support several program areas: 1) *Leadership for Equity*: With their interest in supporting and helping individuals step into their leadership, they are most interested in issue- or identity-focused programs that bring people from different groups together in a cohort that has sustained contact over a period of time. 2) *Field Building*: Their grants support organizations that build the field of leadership development. Your program must be housed in a 501(c)3 organization and center its work on New York City. It must have dedicated staff or volunteers who can take advantage of the Robert Sterling Clark Foundation's support beyond the check. The program also must focus on a particular issue or identity group and involve individuals from a variety of organizations. The foundation does not fund staff development programs, youth leadership, service year or social enterprise programs. They also do not fund startups or staff development programs within a single organization. You may not be eligible for this grant since you just launched your organization but I would definitely consider them once you implement some of your activities. I would recommend applying to them this time next year.

The Foundation aims to support organizations and programs for which a relatively small amount of funding might make a large difference. - **DHS-23-CIS-010-003 - FY 2023 Citizenship and Integration Grant Program: Community and Regional Integration Network Grant (CARING) Department of Homeland Security Office of Procurement Operations - Grants Division:**

OCPE is charged with promoting instruction and training on the rights and responsibilities of citizenship. USCIS recognizes that naturalization is a key milestone in the civic integration of immigrants. Naturalization requirements, such as knowledge of English and U.S. history and government, encourage civic learning and build a strong foundation upon which immigrants can fully integrate into American society. Through preparing for naturalization, immigrants gain tools to become successful citizens and meet their responsibilities as United States citizens. The goal of the Citizenship and Integration Grant Program is to expand the availability of high-quality citizenship preparation services for immigrants across the nation and to provide opportunities for immigrants to gain the knowledge and skills necessary to integrate into the fabric of American society. Since it began in 2009, the Citizenship and Integration Grant Program has awarded more than \$132 million through 579 competitive grants to immigrant-serving organizations in 39 states and the District of Columbia. Now in its 15th year, the program has helped more than 300,000 immigrants prepare for citizenship. The Citizenship and Integration Grant Program supports the objectives of Executive Order 14012, Restoring Faith in Our Legal Immigration Systems and Strengthening Integration and Inclusion Efforts for New Americans and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Strategic Plan for Fiscal Years 2020-2024 by promoting integration, inclusion, and citizenship. The Citizenship and Integration Grant Program also addresses the DHS mission to enforce and administer our immigration laws (captured in the Third Quadrennial Homeland Security Review) and USCIS' mission and values, as the program provides immigrants instruction on the rights and responsibilities of U.S. citizenship and information and support on how to apply for naturalization within the authorized practice of immigration law. The Community and Regional Integration Network Grant (CARING) funding opportunity supports organizations providing extended civic integration services to vulnerable immigrant populations. These integration services build upon, but are not intended to replicate, resettlement services funded by the U.S. Department of State and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

You will also see that there are quite a few Foundation grants that specifically focus on supporting non-profits in New York State and NYC. I think it would be a great opportunity to

apply to some of these more regional/local grants because you will have less competition. Some of the grant opportunities that I included are workforce development grants because even though that is a broader scope, I think the mission of your organization aligns with it – you can argue that offering educational classes and resources to immigrants in some ways is preparing them for the workforce.

Right now, I would focus on any of the following grant applications as they are currently open and accepting applications: #3, #4, #5, #6, #7, #8, #9, #14.

I would also recommend that you register on the City of New York portal to see their grant and contracting opportunities (Grant #1).
